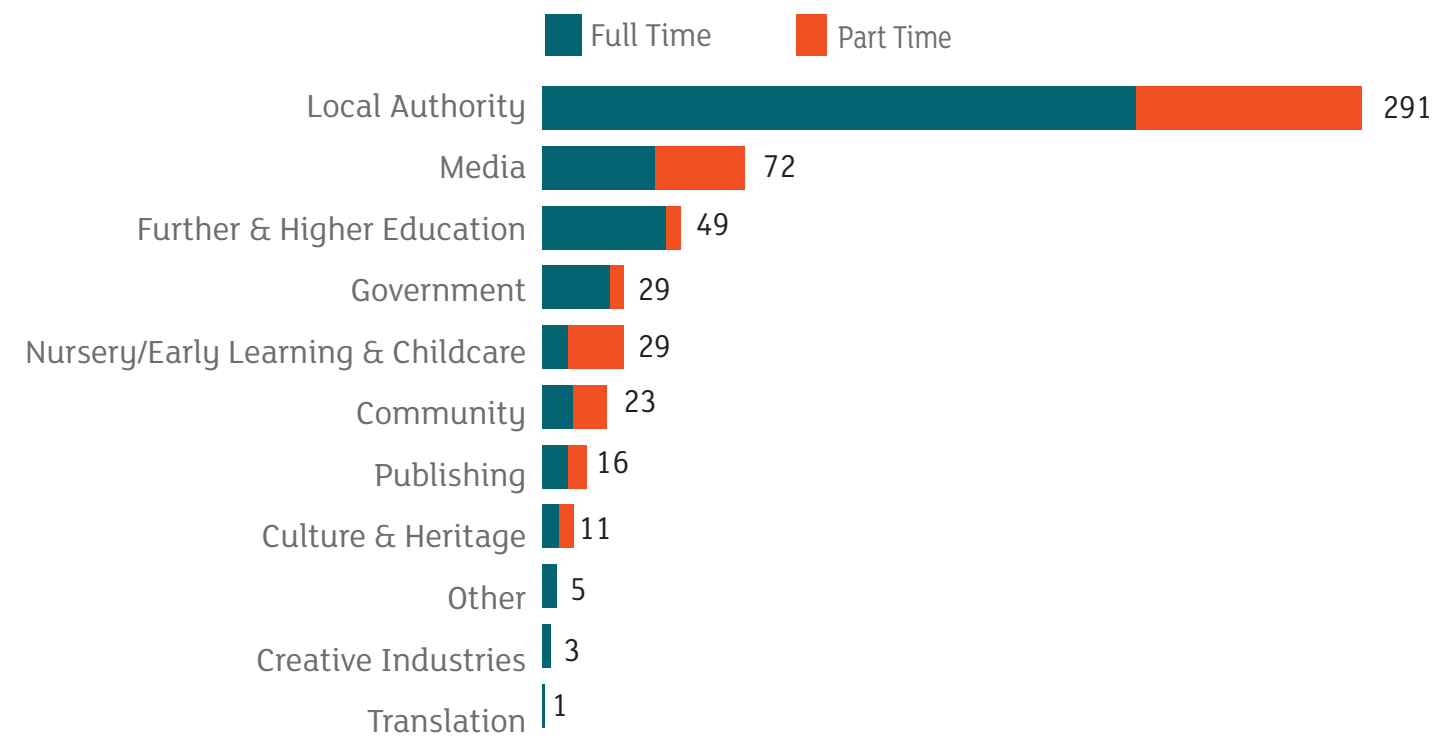


This infographic summarises evidence on demand, supply and provision for Gaelic language. This infographic and the accompanying summary report is available in both English and Gaelic.

Demand

Gaelic Essential Posts by Sector

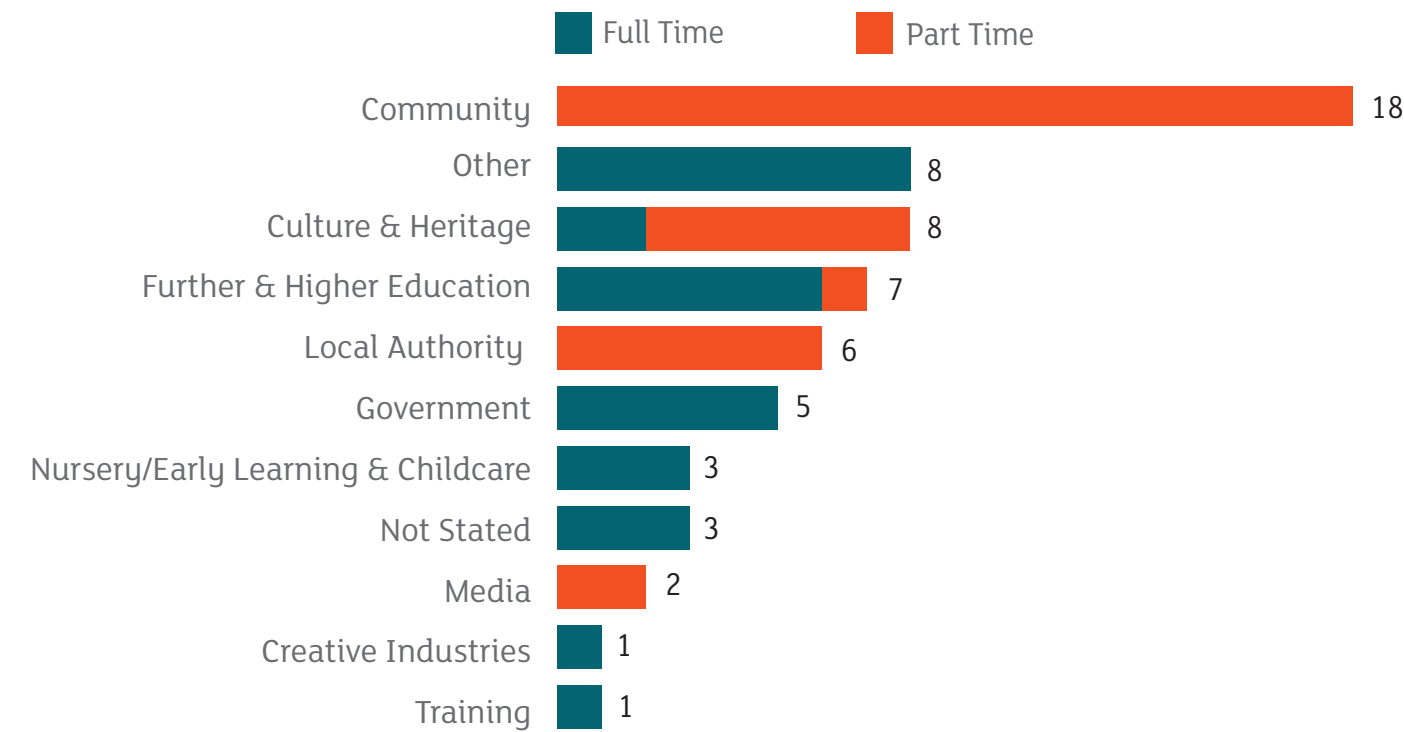
Local Authority is by far the most common sector for both full-time and part-time Gaelic essential posts, as shown. These posts are likely to be largely comprised of Gaelic teaching posts, reflecting the expansion of Gaelic Medium Education (GME).

Gaelic Desirable Posts by Sector

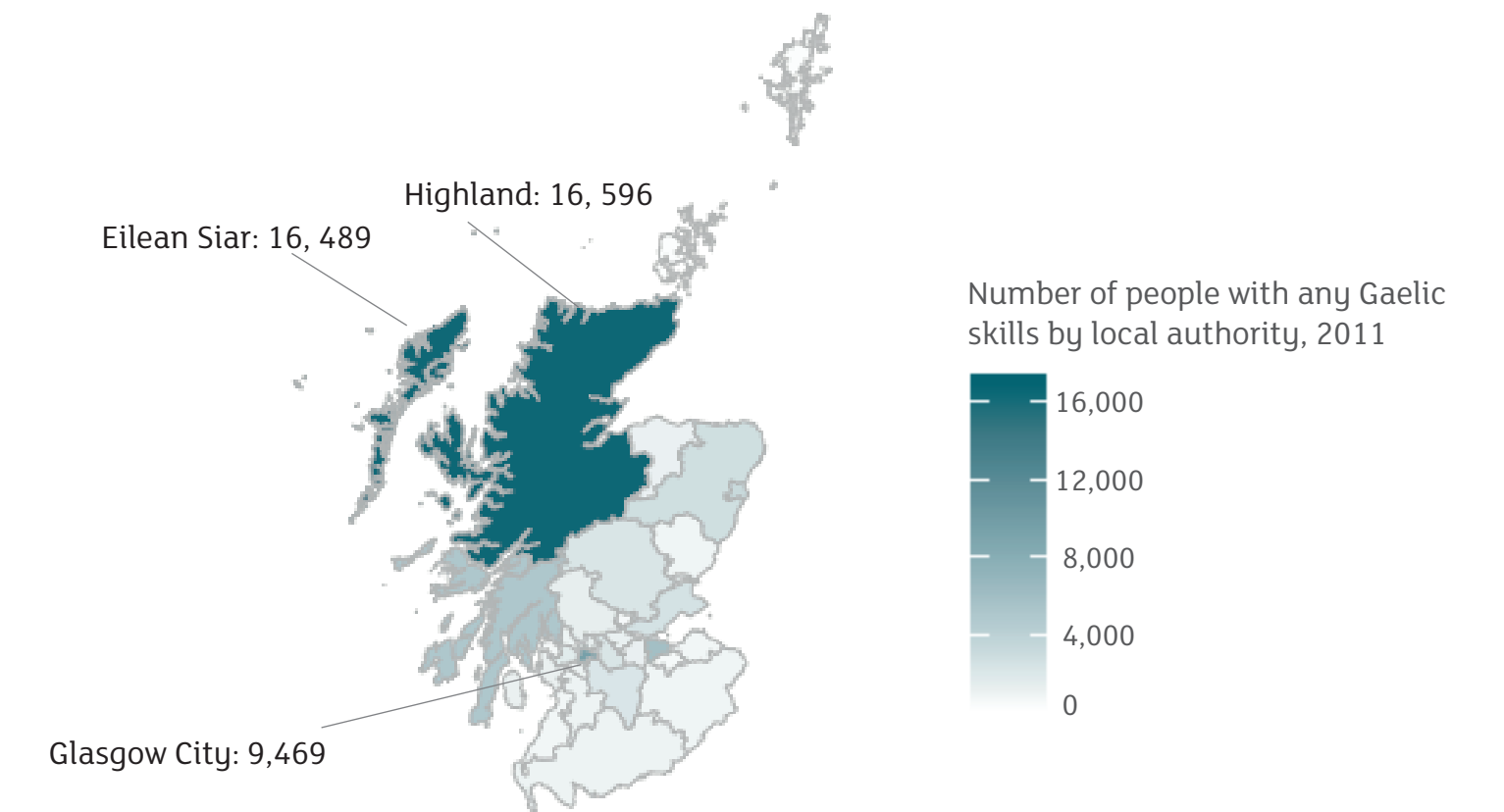
As shown, eight Gaelic desirable full-time posts are categorised as 'Other' which comprises a religious organisation and an agricultural/tourism business. For part-time Gaelic desirable posts, the most common is Community, which accounts for 18 posts. Those classifying themselves as involved in Community activities were generally third sector organisations.

Number and density of people with any Gaelic skills by local authority, 2011

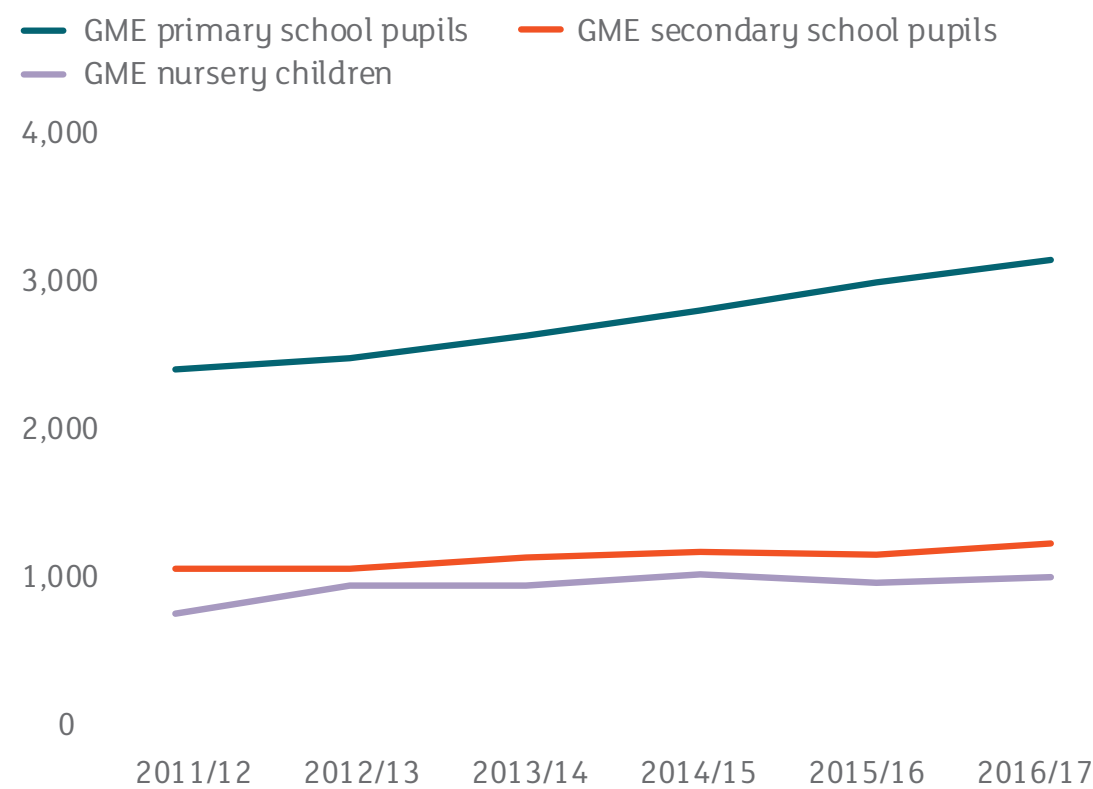
Highland, Eilean Siar and Glasgow, highlighted below, are the top three local authorities in terms of those with any Gaelic skills.

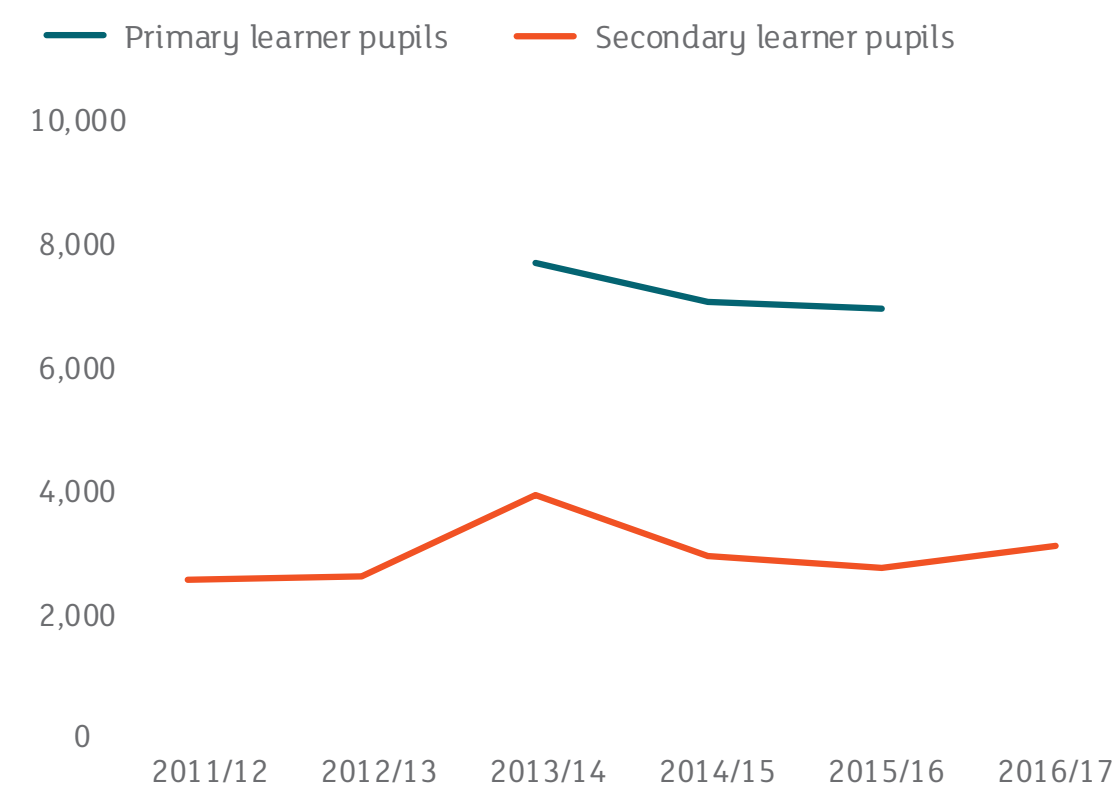

Number of GME secondary, primary and nursery pupils, 2011/12-2016/17

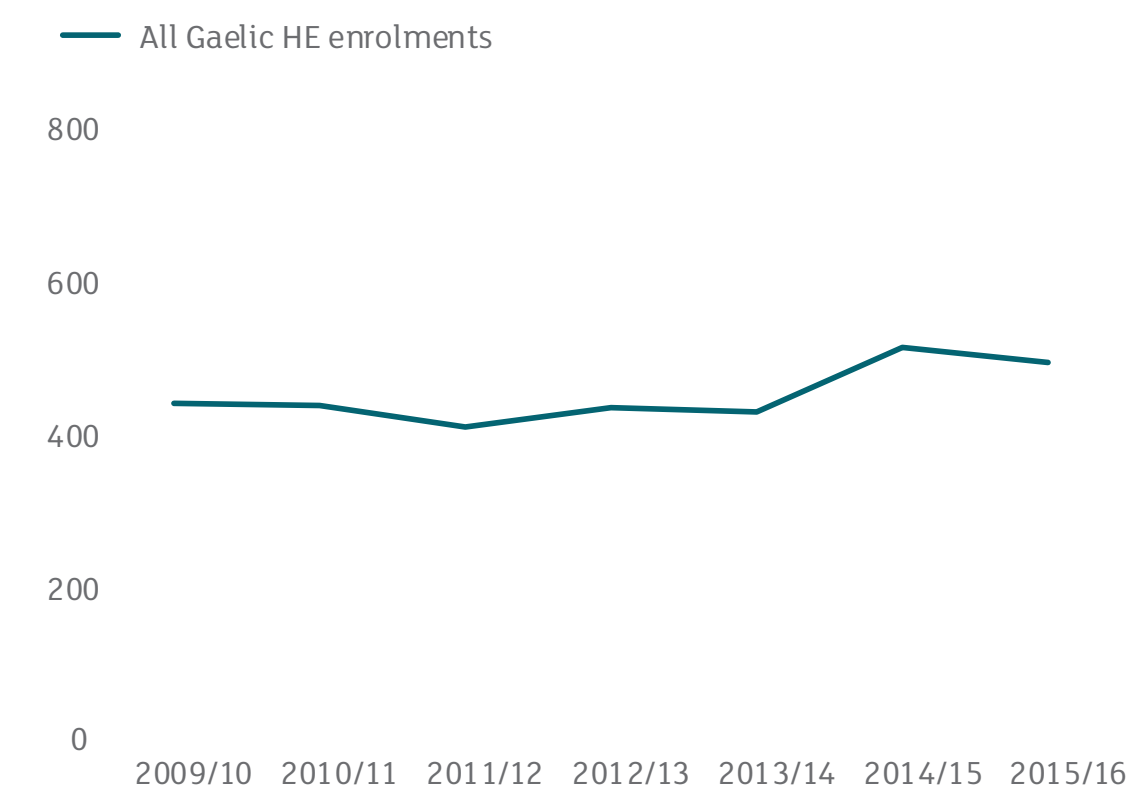
