


WELCOME

Congratulations on beginning your apprenticeship.

This welcome pack was put together by Skills Development Scotland and Who Cares? Scotland to provide some useful information for you, along with some messages from apprentices who have experience of the care system.



The term Care Experienced refers to anyone who has been or is currently:

- in care o
- from a looked-after background at any stage in their life, in each case, no matter how short.

In care means you are or were:

- formally looked after by a local authority;
- looked after at home with support from social services or a social worker; or
- looked after other than in the family home, for example, in foster care, residential/secure care, or kinship care (with family friends or relatives) in each case, no matter how short.

What is the role of my Learning Provider?

They deliver and assess your apprenticeship learning. The Learning Provider will link you up with an assessor - a member of staff from the Learning Provider who is your point of contact. They will meet with you throughout the course of your apprenticeship and support you to complete your learning.

When you complete your apprenticeship, your Learning Provider will award you your final qualification.

What is the role of my line manager?

Unlike your assessor, your line manager works for your employer. They supervise you in your day-to-day job and you can approach them about anything to do with your time in work.

What support does my assessor provide?

Your assessor wants you to succeed and can tailor their support to meet your needs. For example, if you want to see your assessor more regularly, you can ask for this. You and your assessor should have a shared agreement of how often you are going to spend time together. You can change this if you feel that you need more or less support at any time throughout the course of your apprenticeship.

Your assessor is there to help remove any barriers to your learning. This can mean presenting learning materials in a format that suits you best, for example in visual ways such as video and graphics. It can also mean being understanding if life events or personal circumstances are getting in the way of your learning, working with you to find a solution.



TIPS AND ADVICE FROM THREE CARE EXPERIENCED APPRENTICES: ETHAN, KATE AND SIMONA

66 My advice for any Care Experienced individual who is starting an apprenticeship is for you to believe in yourself. In my experience, when you have been in care you rarely have anyone who believes in you or sees any potential in you. When you are offered a job as an apprentice think of it like someone saying "hey, I see potential in you" - and it's up to you to show them what you can do.

This is an opportunity for you to show what you are made of. You may have times when you struggle or are unsure of things - speak to someone about it. The main thing is to not give up. ??

What are my options after I finish my apprenticeship?

Your Learning Provider can tell you about other qualifications you could complete in future, that build on what you are already learning. It can be useful to chat to your training provider and your employer about your career progression, to explore future options. However, you don't need to make your mind up about that yet. A lot of apprentices prefer to just focus on the apprenticeship they are doing right now.
